



OPEN LETTER TO WSSU ALUMNI

Excerpt of comments by Prince Jernigan '73 during presentation of Simon Green Atkins Distinguished Alumni Award to him and his wife Nancy '73 at Founder's Day 2022

GRATITUDE THROUGH GIVING—TIME, TALENTS, AND RESOURCES WE MUST DO BETTER

...Let me share just a few thoughts today to honor Simon Green Atkins and his vision, as well as our responsibility to maintain and advance his mission here at WSSU. To do so, I wish to share...two short stories that happen to come from...the Bible. The first is a story of gratitude... of the 10 lepers. ...the story is of the man we know as Jesus, who...came upon 10 men who were sick with leprosy. They spent their lives being shunned by the local villagers. The 10 lepers begged Jesus for help and...he healed them...and they went rejoicing on their way. However, only one leper came back and told Jesus thank you, and Jesus inquired "Where are the other nine?" The other nine didn't lose their healing but the Bible indicates that the one who showed gratitude was indeed blessed more.

That brings us to LESSON ONE: According to WSSU Foundation statistics, we presently have approximately 30,000 alumni to date. Of that number, roughly 6.4% (1,920) felt enough gratitude in 2021 to give back monetarily to WSSU, which we say we truly love. The question, therefore is, "Where are the other 28,000 alums?"

LESSON TWO: The second story is a story of giving what you have. It is the story of the widow's mite. Jesus tells of a poor widow that gave just two coins (called mites) in the collection plate. Jesus instructed the disciples that ...the wealthy ...could afford to give more. It is the widow who is more noteworthy because she gave all she had. LESSON TWO is about giving what you have.

When Simon Green Atkins founded this institution, he scoured this community and other resources to get anything he could to keep these doors opened. We must ask ourselves where we would be if these doors were not opened to us.

Let's be honest. On this day of celebration of 130 years, we, as alumni, have not collectively given a real thank you to WSSU. A few of the beneficiaries of this institution have like the one leper, made a conscious effort to show their gratitude through alumni work and alumni giving. The question is, "Where are the other 90%?"

Yes, the university has so many needs, and no, we can't expect the State of North Carolina to do for us if we won't do for ourselves. There is no reason we should have so few scholarships for athletics, and we wonder why our teams aren't winning. It shouldn't take 130 years to get two traveling busses when we should have had a fleet of 10! There is no reason that our choir ambassadors must beg to travel and showcase our university. There is no reason the Marching Band can't travel to all away games. There is no reason we should have an athletic facility below seating capacity and lacking climate control. These are only a few in a long list of needs.

We always celebrate Homecoming with big checks paraded before the crowd. These are good but we need 10-20 of these large amounts each week to address our enhancement needs at WSSU.

In conclusion, what should we do?

FIRST, be grateful for all WSSU did for you to start you on your way in life.

SECONDLY, seriously commit your time, talent, and treasure to help our alma mater. We need all hands on deck, particularly the youngest of our alumni. We need more than 40 under 40; we need 10,000 under 40. We need the next generation of chapter workers. The average age of our Baltimore Chapter members is over 60. There is NO excuse with Zoom and other means of communications that you can't get involved. You don't even have to leave your house.

LASTLY, start a legacy of giving. If you can't afford \$18.92 for that campaign, send in the loose \$2 change you may have. The head of the Foundation says no amount is too small. Encourage other alumni and friends to commit to WSSU.

If you really love this place as you say you do, **RESOLVE THIS HOMECOMING THAT WE, ALUMNI, MUST DO BETTER. I'll repeat, RESOLVE THIS DAY WE WILL DO BETTER.**

Class of '72 50 YEAR REFLECTION

Fifty-four years ago, a group of young men and women began a journey on the campus of Winston-Salem State College for the first time. Each student was beginning a journey with the bright-eyed enthusiasm and wonderment of what the next four or five years at this college held in store for us. What dreams could this journey provide? This was the freshmen class of 1972.

This class was unique in that it was a time of undeniable change in American society. Young men and women were being sent off to an unjust war. School desegregation was a constant topic in the South and many of us were first generation products of the 1965 Civil Rights Act to "integrate" the schools. Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. had recently been assassinated, and social unrest and injustice abounded. "Black Power," "Black is Beautiful," and "Love Not War," just to name a few, were slogans of the day!

We came from all walks of life, from all parts of the country. Extremely diversified, we were comprised of Vietnam vets, members of the Black Panthers, SNCC, NAACP, Nation of Islam, etc. Some of our heroes were the likes of Rap Brown, Huey P Newton, Angela Davis, Eldridge Cleaver, Stokley Carmichael, and Malcolm X. This could only mean one thing. We were "radical." And so, we were dubbed by the administration.

We were determined that we were not going to accept the status quo of Winston-Salem State College. We were going to make changes. And we did. We immediately sought and were elected to positions of student leadership and rallied the student body to take control of the campus. Class boycotts, sit-outs, marches, demonstrations, fires, and a few unmentionables resulted in such changes as non-compulsory class attendance, no curfew for female students, better food, SGA representation on the Board, and no more mandatory religious assemblies.

During our tenure, Winston-Salem State College transitioned into Winston-Salem State University. We were extremely proud of that! Now, we have come full circle. Many of the places we knew are no longer there, such as Momma Lou's chicken plates, collards, and crackling cornbread, Nasty Anne's and the College Grill's burgers and beer.

Dr. Kenneth Williams, Dr. Joseph Patterson, Dr. Manderline Scales, and so many other mentors are all gone. They taught us well. We will not see another 50th but the memories still prevail.

Over the years, Winston-Salem State University has evolved into the 21st Century as one of the top HBCUs in the country with continued growth and expansion to come. We "DEPARTED TO SERVE," and as we look back we are indeed PROUD!
